

MARKET ALERTS

Lemons - Throught the summer, fruit sizes 165ct and smaller will be in short supply. Markets for sizes 140ct through 200ct are strong and trending upwards.

Oranges - Navels near their end, Valencias will become the main variety in a few weeks. Sizes 88/113/138ct are scarce and will remain so throughout the Valencia season. Florida's season is concluding as they face challenges with regreening.

Iceberg Lettuce - As a result of the holiday push, there is a low availability. Cool weather has slowed production, but warmer temperatures are expected the following week, which may increase production.

Lightweights, discolorations, and misshapen heads are common defects.

Lettuce Leaf - Romaine, green leaf, and red leaf supplies will be limited this week, Common defects include discoloration, brown butts, lightweights, twisting, and small bunches, as well as fringe and tip burns. Quality is expected to be fair in the coming weeks.

Onions - Red onion supply is limited, leading to higher pricing. However, as the California harvest increases, supplies are expected to improve. Yellows and whites remain steady to lower

CROP UPDATES

Warm, mostly dry weather through Thursday, with showers and t-storms in Northern Florida. Temperatures will trend cooler, exacerbated by a cold storm system in California. Anthracnose impacts romaine and iceberg production, potentially leading to supply shortages. Read more

WEATHER

<u>Arizona</u> - Northerly winds will increase, with gusts increasing from 20-25mph. Temperatures will rise from mid 80s to low 90s, then to 101 by Sunday. Morning lows will be in the 50s to 60s.

<u>California</u> - A high pressure system will bring near-average temperatures along the coast and above-average temperatures inland. Morning temperatures will be cool, while daytime temperatures will be hot. Offshore winds will weaken, allowing cooling.

Florida -Warm, mostly dry weather through Thursday in Northern Florida. Expect showers and t-storms on Friday, increased shower activity over weekend, cooler temperatures, and gusting winds near 25 mph.

<u>Mexico</u> - Central Mexico expects warm daytime temperatures, high 90s through Sunday, low 90s to near 100s, and occasional light showers, with most spots remaining dry.

<u>Asparagus</u>

Peruvian supplies are improving this week, and the market is adjusting lower. Larger sizes such as XL's and Jumbo's still remain on the tighter side. Asparagus supplies in Washington are also good, and you should see some aggressive pricing after Mother's Day. It has been a slow start to Michigan asparagus season this week, but it should improve as we move into June. As Mexican supplies transition from Caborca to Southern Baja, they remain tight. Once Baja and Central Mexico get going, supplies should improve in Mexico in June.

<u>Avocados</u>

The market is getting slightly better on 60/70ct. Through the season, triggers may remain in play for 48ct. Peru is just around the corner, with fruit expected to arrive late-May/early-June. The size of the Peruvian fruit entering the US is expected to peak at 60/70ct; this is not normal for Peruvian fruit. Due to the high dry matter of Mexican fruit, ripening times remain short. California fruit is coming online in a light way with ripening time being longer due to lower dry matter.

The main region is Oxnard/Ventura County, with San Joaquin Valley winding down. 140ct through 200ct markets are strong and continue to rise.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

A high pressure system remains over the area bringing near average temperatures along the coast and above average temperatures inland. It will be cool in the morning with lows in the upper 30s to low 50s, and hot in the daytime with highs in the mid 60s to low 80s. As the winds turn offshore Thursday, temperatures will rise further inland, reaching the low-upper 80s away from the coast. The offshore flow weakens over the weekend, allowing for some cooling, but temperatures remain in the low 60s to mid 80s.



MEXICO

Over a good portion of Central Mexico, daytime temperatures will be warm and mostly 90 degrees or higher. Through Sunday, temperatures will reach the low 90s to near 100 degrees. Throughout the weekend, lows will drop into the upper 50s to mid 60s. Several light showers may occur over the area, but most spots should remain dry.



FLORIDA

Through Thursday, it will be warm but mostly dry. Northern Florida can expect some showers and t-storms on Friday. There will be a greater amount of shower activity over the weekend, but it will still be isolated. Temperatures should trend cooler toward the weekend. Throughout much of Southern Florida, winds will gust near 25 mph.



ARIZONA

There will be increasing northerly winds today, with gusts of 20-25mph in the morning increasing to 30-38mph in the afternoon. Through Thursday, winds gradually decrease, becoming southwesterly by Friday. During a building ridge of high pressure, high temperatures will rise from mid 80s to low 90s by Wednesday and Thursday, to mid 90s to 101 by Sunday afternoon. Through Friday, morning lows will be in the upper 50s to low 60s, warming to the mid 60s by Sunday.

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

A high-pressure system remains over the area bringing near average temperatures along the coast and above average temperatures inland. It will be cool in the morning with lows in the upper 30s to low 50s, and hot in the daytime with highs in the mid 60s to low 80s. As the winds turn offshore Thursday, temperatures will rise further inland, reaching the low-upper 80s away from the coast. The offshore flow weakens over the weekend, allowing for some cooling, but temperatures remain in the low 60s to mid 80s.

Over a good portion of Central Mexico, daytime temperatures will be warm and mostly 90 degrees or higher. Through Sunday, temperatures will reach the low 90s to near 100 degrees. Throughout the weekend, lows will drop into the upper 50s to mid 60s. Several light showers may occur over the area, but most spots should remain dry.

Through Thursday, it will be warm but mostly dry. Northern Florida can expect some showers and t-storms on Friday. There will be a greater amount of shower activity over the weekend, but it will still be isolated. Temperatures should trend cooler toward the weekend. The cold storm system that rolled through California over the weekend brought moderate precipitation to the Salinas Valley with light trace amounts recorded in the Santa Maria and Oxnard regions. The Salinas Valley received between 1/4"-3/4" of an inch of rain along with much coolertemperatures and strong winds. This late season storm system will only exacerbate the mold, mildew and disease pressure impacting the fields. Anthracnose continues to impact romaine and to a lesser extent iceberg production with lighter yields as growers work through affected acreage. Production continues to show smaller head sizes with less solidity/density contributing to lighter carton weights. Growers reaching for supplies are entering these stands early to meet current demand, leaving less available acreage as harvests gain momentum. This may lead to some short-term supply shortages in iceberg, romaine and cauliflower moving forward.



Strawberry production is expected to quickly rebound from the recent rains with a good fruit set and various regions in production currently.

The California cherry growing regions of Central California received up to ¾" of an inch of rain from this late season storm. Growers had their fungicide spray rigs and wind rigs out in the groves following the system to help dry out the groves. Overall damage is expected to be minimal from early reports from the regions. Production will continue to slowly gain momentum as we move through May. Washington cherry season is slated to begin with light harvests in early June with the crop reported to be in good shape by most growers.

The domestic melon season is just around the corner as offshore volumes decline seasonally. Current supplies from Guatemala continue with good quality and brix reported. Supplies will quickly decline as the offshore season comes to an end over the next few weeks. Domestic supplies from the southwestern desert regions are set to begin light harvests the week of May 20th. Early field reports indicate the fruit being on the smaller side when harvests begin.
